#### **GLORY TO JESUS CHRIST! GLORY FOREVER!** March 25, 2012

Dear	 ,

Spring arrived on Tuesday March 20...March came in like a lamb and is going nest. Yes, I know we've been preparing for out like a lamb. Remember when we used to THE DAY from the beginning of the Great say, "spring is right around the corner"? Well, I think they must have demolished that giving and confessions. I'm talking now building because there wasn't any corner this year. We definitely went from here-tothere in one straight line! I know it's been warm all around the country, but it is really quite amazing to see the results of this recent be hard in the next few weeks to find a warm spell here in Western New York. The flowers and new growth are something we don't normally experience until late April or early May. All the spring flowers are in bloom from the pussy willow (hope you got yours before they blossomed), crocus, hyacinth and daffodil to the forsythia. The magnolias are ready to break out of their buds in the next day or so, and the fruit trees are even showing their leaves. Everyone is saying how wonderful all this is, especially those silly weather people, who cheer at each news broadcast and can't wait to tell us that we've broken another temperature record.

I know it's comfortable and pleasant to be outdoors enjoying the warmth, but I can't help wondering what's next. Our friends, the weeks. All our parishes across the country are now becoming quite busy as the preparations for the "Great Day" have begun in ear-Fast with our Lenten prayers, fasting, almsabout those special items that have to do with the "breaking of the Fast," namely the preparation, purchase or sales of all the wonderful foods we have at Pascha. Well, maybe we thought of it, but we didn't do it. ② As I write I can almost smell that kitchen right now!

A week from today will already be Palm Sunday and then we'll be into Holy Week. Pascha will be here before we know it, so keep up the good fight of this holy and special time as we continue to prepare for the glorious Resurrection.

Today on the new calendar we are celebrating "the Conception of Jesus." We don't normally say it that way, rather we call this holy day "The Annunciation to our Most Holy Lady, the Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary by the Archangel Gabriel." At the moment of Mary's great YES, "the One Lord, Jesus Christ, the Son of God, came down from heaven and became incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the blessed Virgin Mary and was made man...." In today's Gospel we learn about a very special request that two of the disciples, the sons of Zebedee make to Jesus. The request of James and John was a significant request. "Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you." And Jesus said to them, "What do you want me to do for you?" And they said, "Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory." (Mark 10:37). James and John were asking if let this cup pass from me. Nevertheless, not my they could sit at the right and left hand of the Lord in His kingdom, but they did not understand what that involved. They did not realize that glory came with the ultimate price. There is much of John and James in each of us. We all desire for the goodness of the Lord Father's choice for Him, handed over for Him to fill our lives, and to respond to our needs in to drink out of love for the world. Now, the the way that we desire. Now, Jesus did not rebuke them for making this request. There is significance of this cup. "The Son of man really nothing wrong with desiring to be close to Jesus, with desiring to be in His presence. But Jesus had just shared with His disciples the truth concerning His sacrifice for the world; he was trying to communicate truth to them concerning the salvation of others, and James and John were too preoccupied with themselves to fully understand what they were asking of Jesus. Furthermore, they did not even understand the implications of their own desires. Jesus says, "You do not know what you are asking for. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink?" (Mark 10:38). James and John had no idea that the cup Jesus was referring to would lead to His crucifixion.

The disciples did not know that Jesus would have to go through great suffering. Or that His position would cause Him to have to pay the ultimate price. James and John wanted to be part of Christ's glory, but were they willing to pay the same price? Without much thought, they replied, "We are able to drink of to returning and rebuilding the city after the the cup." But they had no idea as to the extent of suffering which the Lord was referring discovered that it was a far tougher place to

to. The cup to which Jesus referred was meant as a common symbol of what life hands you: the realm of your experience, the circumstances in which you are placed. You are handed a cup to drink. You have no choice as to what is in the cup, but you must drink it. Jesus, of course, is referring to the Cross. It is a cup given to Him by His Father, which He must drink. You recall, in the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus prayed, "If it be possible, will but yours be done" (Luke 22:42). So Jesus is speaking of the whole spectrum of events involving the suffering, the anguish, the pain, the rejection, the mocking, the scourging - every part of the Cross - as the disciples had no way of understanding the came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Mark 10:45). Already, this Sunday of Lent allows a glimmer of the light of Holy Week to shine in. Next Saturday will be the Saturday of Lazarus, whom Jesus will raise from the dead, followed by Palm Sunday, Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. The Church, therefore, urges us in anticipation of the feast which we will soon celebrate - to develop the proper attitude we should have as we come closer to **Christ's Passion and Resurrection.** 

A voung New Orleans husband and wife, while reluctantly packing up their U-Haul truck, were recently captured in a color photograph for a front-page New York Times report about the failures faced by many New Orleans urban pioneers. The bitter twist in that Times story was that many of those brave pioneers, like the couple with the U-Haul, had thought that they were committed Katrina floods - but the folks in the story had

live post-Katrina than they ever imagined. In a profound way, that New Orleans couple represents all of us. They are a striking icon as we near the home stretch of our Lenten iourney. More and more, as Americans, we are rootless. Sometimes, we are driven by storms like Hurricane Katrina. But, more often we are like that couple with the U-Haul—driven not by a storm itself but by the needs of our families, the fortunes of our employers, and the fears and hopes that swell in our hearts as much as in our heads. Most Americans simply do not envision a hometown anymore where we expect to be planted conveniently near the homes of our posterity who will visit us and keep the roots of our lineage alive and well in the same hometown, let alone the same area. Our iconic images of home are transforming. Norman Rockwell's beloved drawing of Thanksgiving dinner featuring a golden turkey triumphantly presented at the family homestead no longer portrays the American vision we had growing up as children decades ago. But, here is the timeless note of hope: We can face even the bitterest truths, because fundamentally we are heading down the Lenten road as a People of Good News, as children of a God who loves us and who brings us to the glory found beyond the cross we bear. The glory that will one day lead us home to the Kingdom of God! We know our destination. In the turbulent oceans of change all around us these days, we are the people who know how to swim, to sail - and to pull others into the boats with us. More than that, on His own Earth-shaking journey to Jerusalem more than 2,000 years ago, Jesus tried his best to equip us for the road. He kept picking up and pointing out things along the way that he wanted us all to remember like programming the Gospel equivalent of a spiritual GPS. The Good News is we are not lost, even in a changing society with families

dispersed throughout the United States; we are not lost to each other or to God. Maybe restless, rootless and bruised, but we are not lost. More than 2 billion Christians around the world have marked their Lenten journey in some fashion this year, including hundreds of millions of Americans. All around the world, we are people on the move. We are just like Jesus' friends two millennia ago. And, the truth of this journey is so timeless that it is echoed and reflected everywhere we look—if we only have eyes and ears to truly recognize the meaningful things along our path. The most frequently asked question by news reporters when they talk to men, women, and children who were burned out, bombed out, blown out, flooded, or driven out is this: "What did you bring with you when you left your home? What did you carry?" It is not an idle question because, whether we realize it or not, we are all moving in some way, shape, or form. We are already carrying things as we search for home. We carry the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we carry the wisdom of scripture, and we carry a multitude of blessings through the sacraments. But as we approach the final stretch of our Lenten Journey, have we been transformed by the changes we have made? Have we carried our cross as we search for our home? Do we know Jesus or do we simply know about Him? A priest once shared a story about the time he went to work with some poor people in a village in the mountains of North America. He was deeply impressed by one old man who, despite having no running water, no electricity and little food, was so joyful. 'How come you're so happy when you have so little?' asked the priest. 'Because I know Jesus and that is all I need,' replied the old man. As we finish our Lenten Journey, we too need to know Jesus in order to carry our cross home, no matter where our journey leads or where our family

roots may grow – we need to know Jesus and bring Him everywhere that we go.
